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Introduction

In accordance with §§ 4-1601(d), 4-107, and 4-401(d) of the Public Safety Article, §§ 11-1006(g) and 11-923(g) of the Criminal Procedure Article, and § 4-516(a) of the Family Law Article, the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention and Policy (Office) must submit an annual report to the Governor and the General Assembly, as it relates to the distribution of funding from, and an overview of, the following grant programs:¹

- Protecting Against Hate Crimes (PAHC), as required by § 4-1601(d) of the Public Safety Article;
- Body Armor for Local Law Enforcement (BARM), as required by § 4-107 of the Public Safety Article;
- Sexual Assault Kit Testing (SAKT), as required by § 4-401(d) of the Public Safety Article;
- Survivors of Homicide Grant (SOHG), as required by § 11-1006(g) of the Criminal Procedure Article;
- Sexual Assault/Rape Crisis (SARC), as required by § 11-923(g) of the Criminal Procedure Article; and
- Maryland Domestic Violence Program (DOMV), as required by § 4-516(a) of the Family Law Article.

Pursuant to its charge, this *Grant Programs FY 2025 Report* includes information regarding the distribution of money from the PAHC, BARM, SAKT, SOHG, SARC, and DOMV grant programs; and provides an overview of each, to include the services provided and the outcome of awarded funds. Evaluation of Program Assessment for Victim Services Awards

In April 2024, the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) initiated its annual process to allow agencies to update their Managing for Results (MFR) Strategic Plans to ensure requests from the legislature, metrics for newly established programs, and Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) are integrated in the plan. Because data-driven decisions are the foundation of the Office, the measures used to inform policy, practices, and funding decisions must be accurate and meaningful. For this reason, the Office examined several victim-specific performance measures to determine if the measures provided an actual representation of victims served in Maryland.

Based on an internal evaluation of the program assessment method for victim services awards, which required a manual review of programmatic data to identify and remove duplicate entries, the Office found limitations due to several overly general data metrics. Because the measures lacked clear and specific definitions, which hindered the ability to present findings in a meaningful way, the Office developed new measures in May 2024, which were approved by DBM for the FY 2026 MFR Strategic Plan (*as listed below*).² The Office also created definitions for each measure to ensure consistency with the data collection and submission process.³

- How many primary crime victims were served during this reporting period (unduplicated count)?
- How many secondary crime victims (surviving family member or other individual) were served during this reporting period (unduplicated count)?

On October 1, 2024, subrecipients were informed of the evaluation and new performance measures to reflect the outcome of the grant program. They were also asked to report on new measures as part of their mandated programmatic submissions, effective July 1, 2024. Given the importance to identify victims served by funding source, the Office added the following measures for subrecipients to report on, effective January 1, 2025:

³ A **primary** victim is an individual who directly experiences harm or abuse as the result of a crime; such as physical, emotional, or sexual violence. A **secondary** victim is an individual who is indirectly affected by a crime or harmful event as a result of a crime. They may be impacted emotionally or psychologically because of their relationship with the primary victim. **Unduplicated count** means that each victim is counted only once even if the victim meets more than one criteria, specific data variable, or service. **Ongoing** means services that are provided to current victims that are not counted under the new primary or secondary metrics.

- During this reporting period and using ALL funding sources (all grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.), how many total unduplicated NEW victims (both primary and secondary victims) who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?
- During this reporting period and using ALL funding sources (all grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.), how many unduplicated NEW primary victims who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?
- During this reporting period and using ALL funding sources (all grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.), how many unduplicated NEW secondary victims who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?
- During this reporting period and using ONLY THESE grant funds, how many NEW total victims (both primary and secondary victims) who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?
- During this reporting period and using ONLY THESE grant funds, how many NEW primary victims who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?
- During this reporting period and using ONLY THESE grant funds, how many NEW secondary victims who live, work, or were victimized in Maryland were served?

Based on the identified changes, as well as a new methodology to identify subrecipient reported information through an internal interactive data dashboard, all performance measures for victim services awards provide a better representation of victims served in Maryland as well as the funding source used (*as described in the [SOHG](#), [SARC](#), and [DOMV](#) sections*). The new methodology is also used across all funding streams to improve internal processes and increase efficiency for the collection and analysis of performance metrics.

Grant Programs

Protecting Against Hate Crimes Grant Program

Pursuant to § 4-1601(d) of the Public Safety Article, this *Protecting Against Hate Crimes Grant Program* section includes information on the administration and distribution of the special, nonlapsing fund to provide eligible entities with needed resources to aid protective efforts against hate crimes. The Office administers the PAHC grant program to provide support and security enhancements to non-profit organizations, including faith-based organizations, with facilities and membership that can be targeted for hate crimes.⁴ Funds assist subrecipients in providing security technology, supplemental funding for security personnel, training, and other related security expenses based on the need of the organization. In March 2024, the Office released a *Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)* to invite eligible applicants to apply for grant funds.

In FY 2025, the annual State budget provided \$5,000,000 in general funds for the PAHC program. Through this program, the Office awarded a total of \$4,964,332 to non-profit organizations, including faith-based organizations to enhance security (*as illustrated in Table 1*). The remaining \$35,668 was not awarded, as one approved subrecipient award was canceled when the organization was unable to meet a program requirement necessary to receive grant funds.

Through the PAHC grant program, awarded funds were used to provide the necessary security enhancements to improve the overall safety of the organizations. Some of the specific funding expenditures served to cover the cost of security personnel, closed-circuit cameras, training, door hardening, and improved lighting. In addition, and based on the quarterly submission of performance measure data, awarded subrecipients reported the following outcomes in FY 2025:⁶

- 73,265 people felt safer as a result of the security enhancements⁷
- 2,372 staff received training on security enhancements
- 1,324 equipment purchased
- 4,821 security enhancements
- 443 safety assessment surveys conducted
- 514 trainings

⁶ It is important to note that performance measure data may reflect underreported figures due to the date in which the data was extracted from the Office's Grants Management System (GMS) in order to submit this report on time. Although subrecipients are required to submit performance measure data within 15 after the end of the quarter, late submissions and/or data changes often occur. For this reason, data should be extracted 45 days after the end of the quarter to capture final figures.

⁷ It is important to note that the number of people who felt safer as a result of the security enhancements is based on subrecipient reported information for the fourth quarter, only. Because this measure is asked each quarter, these figures cannot be added over the grant cycle given that such totals may provide an overrepresentation of the data. Therefore, the Office selected the final quarter in FY 2025 (April 1, 2025 - June 30, 2025) to capture this figure.

- 159 hate crimes reported to law enforcement
- 400 security personnel supported with grant funds

Body Armor for Local Law Enforcement Grant Program

Pursuant to § 4-107 of the Public Safety Article, this *Body Armor for Local Law Enforcement Grant Program* section includes information on the distribution of money under this subtitle, and the ratio of protective body armor to police officers in each local jurisdiction of the State that applies for money from BARM. The primary purpose of the BARM grant program is to protect the lives of law enforcement officers with protective body armor or stab-resistant vests.⁸ Funds are used to assist local law enforcement agencies in procuring protective body armor and stab-resistant vests for their officers and replacing protective body armor if testing or age indicates a need for replacement. It also allows agencies to request funding for protective body armor that conforms to the current edition of the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) Standard and V-50 ballistic testing requirements. Agencies that request funding must provide a 50% cash match from the agency or county budget; however, State funds cannot be used to meet the match requirement. Distribution of Protective Body Armor Fund Awards

To receive assistance from the BARM grant program, a 50% cash match is required. As shown below, if a law enforcement agency requests \$500, they must provide a match of \$500 which would result in the total purchase of \$1,000 in vests.

\$500 request + \$500 match = \$1,000 total purchase for vests

In addition, law enforcement agencies must indicate how the cash match will be provided in their application narrative.⁹ The cash match may take the form of funds contributed from local governments such as agency or county budgets. State grant funds cannot be used to meet the BARM match requirement. Funds from the Federal Bulletproof Vest Program, also known as the Patrick Leahy Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BPV) Program,¹⁰ may also be used to meet the

BARM match requirement. Subrecipients must maintain records which clearly show the source and amount of all matching contributions.

In 2025, the Office awarded \$48,696 from the BARM grant program to 14 local law enforcement agencies within seven jurisdictions for the combined purchase of 106 body armor vests (*as illustrated in Table 2*).

Based on information reported by the 14 awarded law enforcement agencies, there were a total of 3,656 sworn officers during the reporting period. From this total, 2.90% (n = 106) received a vest through the BARM grant award (*as illustrated in Table 3*).

Sexual Assault Kit Testing Grant Program

Pursuant to § 4-401(d) of the Public Safety Article, this *Sexual Assault Kit Testing Grant Program* section includes information on the distribution of funds to law enforcement agencies to pay for testing of sexual assault evidence collection kits (SAKs) by forensic laboratories. It also identifies efforts pertaining to the Track-Kit™ reporting program from InVita Healthcare Technologies, as required by § 11-926.1 of the Criminal Procedure Article. The Office administers the SAKT grant program to provide funding to Maryland's six Combined DNA Index System (CODIS) laboratories for capacity expansion and testing SAKs and thereby reduce the number of untested SAKs.¹¹

Distribution of Sexual Assault Kit Testing Grant Fund Awards

The Office received four applications for the SAKT FY 2025 funding cycle. Following the application review, all four applications received full funding of their requests and were awarded. Through this program, the Office awarded a total of \$1,755,285 (*as illustrated in Table 4*).

The SAKT program provided \$1,755,285 to four CODIS laboratories in Maryland, including the Maryland State Police, which tests kits collected by local law enforcement agencies that do not have a CODIS laboratory in their jurisdiction, and three local law enforcement agencies to pay for the testing of SAKs by forensic laboratories. Awarded funds support the testing of kits through a combination of equipment upgrades, contractual testing services provided by qualified

private laboratories, and increased staffing. In addition, and based on the quarterly submission of performance measure data, awarded subrecipients reported the following outcomes in FY 2025:¹²

- 2,355 untested kits were in evidence storage at the start of the April 1, 2025 quarter¹³
- 157 GBMC slide cases with completed analyzation
- 323 sexual assault kits tested
 - 291 kits tested by outsourcing
 - 32 kits tested by in-house personnel
- 101 DNA profiles entered into CODIS¹⁴
- 6 CODIS hits

Track-Kit™ Reporting Program

Track-Kit™ is a system designed to ensure that each sexual assault evidence kit is collected and processed in a timely and transparent manner. It monitors the movement of each kit and maintains a detailed timeline, allowing survivors to securely track the status and location of their evidence. The system also generates reports to help the State monitor compliance with testing protocols as required by § 11-926.1 of the Criminal Procedure Article.

During the first year of the program, over 1,500 evidence kits were collected, 350 survivors checked the status of their evidence, and 171 independent medical facilities, law enforcement agencies, and laboratories began entering data into the tracking system for newly collected sexual assault evidence kits. In the fall of 2025, law enforcement agencies across Maryland will begin entering information into the system for sexual assault evidence kits collected prior to May 2024. Each historic kit entry will indicate in the tracking system whether a kit has been tested for forensic evidence, qualifies for an exception from testing, or still requires analysis. The deadline for completing these entries is March 31, 2026. Once this process is complete, Maryland will have a comprehensive understanding of the testing status of its backlog and be better positioned to assess the resources and funding needed to complete the project.

Survivors of Homicide Grant Program

Pursuant to § 11-1006(g) of the Criminal Procedure Article, this *Survivors of Homicide Grant Program* section includes information on the distribution of funds to provide services to survivors of homicide in Maryland. The Office administers the SOHG program to establish and expand programs that address homicide survivors' specific needs.¹⁵ Funds assist subrecipients in providing victim assistance, advocacy, support, and other coordinated justice system responses, and to ensure survivors of homicide victims are able to exercise their rights entitled by law.

In FY 2025, the annual State budget provided \$499,068 in general funds for the SOHG program and the Office awarded the following subrecipients (*as illustrated in Table 5*).

Through the SOHG program, awarded funds were used to help subrecipients provide comprehensive services to meet the specific needs of survivors of homicide in ways not otherwise covered by the Maryland Criminal Injuries Compensation Board. These services included, but were not limited to: providing or facilitating referrals to appropriate counseling, legal, mental health, and advocacy services for survivors of homicide victims including specialized support services to adult and minor survivors of homicide victims; and providing a toll-free telephone number and assistance to exercise the rights to which the survivors are entitled by law. In addition, and based on the quarterly submission of revised performance measures (*as described in the [evaluation of program assessment for victim services awards](#) section*), awarded subrecipients reported the following outcomes in FY 2025:¹⁶

- 4,145 new victims served through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 368 victims served through the SOHG program
- 6,276 victims received ongoing services through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 3,145 victims received ongoing services through the SOHG program
- New and returning victims received the following new and/or ongoing services:

Sexual Assault/Rape Crisis Grant Program

Pursuant to § 11-923(g) of the Criminal Procedure Article, this *Sexual Assault/Rape Crisis Grant Program* section includes information on the distribution of funds to provide services to victims and survivors. Administered by the Office, the SARC grant is a statewide program that assists subrecipients to provide services to victims of sexual violence and their families. Through the program, funds are available to private and non-profit organizations and government agencies. Eligible entities must be “full service” rape crisis centers, as identified by the Maryland Coalition Against Sexual Assault (MCASA).¹⁷

The purpose of this program is to meet the needs of victims of rape and sexual offenses.¹⁸ Funds assist subrecipients in providing services to victims through 24-hour hotline, counseling, medical accompaniment, and assistance to access and use other support services, such as legal assistance. Funds are also designated for preventative efforts, including presentations to community groups, pamphlets, and radio and television public service announcements.

Grant funds currently support 17 full-service rape crisis programs to provide comprehensive services to meet the specific needs of rape and sexual assault victims and family members affected by the abuse. Grant funds also support Maryland's federally recognized State sexual assault coalition, MCASA, which provides technical assistance and support to Maryland's comprehensive sexual assault/rape crisis centers. Providing services and community education fosters a coordinated community approach to serving victims and includes partnerships with law enforcement, courts, hospitals, local departments of social services, and other related support agencies.

In FY 2025, the annual State budget provided \$3,873,999 in general funds for the SARC program and the Office awarded the following subrecipients (*as illustrated in Table 6*).

Through the SARC program, awarded funds were used to meet the needs of victims of rape and sexual offenses. In addition, and based on the quarterly submission of revised performance measures (as described in the [evaluation of program assessment for victim services awards section](#)), awarded subrecipients reported the following outcomes in FY 2025:¹⁹

- 4,914 new victims served through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 1,628 victims served through the SARC program
- 6,807 victims received ongoing services through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 2,553 victims received ongoing services through the SARC program
- New and returning victims received the following new and/or ongoing services:
 - 4,877 provided with information on criminal prosecution, civil law remedies, sexual assault evidence collection, and victims' rights
 - 659 referred to Vine Protective Order (VPO)
 - 267 registered and/or assisted registering for Vine Protective Order (VPO)

Domestic Violence Programs

Pursuant to § 4-516(a) of the Family Law Article, this *Domestic Violence Programs* section includes information on the distribution of funds to provide comprehensive services that meet the specific needs of domestic violence victims and their families. The Office administers the DOMV program, a statewide program that is funded through the State's annual budget, and the federal Family Violence Prevention and Services (FVPS), funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, to make temporary shelter environments and supportive services available through a network of local domestic violence services programs.²⁰ Through the DOMV/FVPS program, funds are available to comprehensive domestic violence programs to include private and non-profit organizations, as well as local governmental agencies.²¹

The purpose of this program is to prevent incidents of family violence, domestic violence, and dating violence and to meet the needs of all victims and their dependents, including those in underserved communities. Funds are used to assist subrecipients in providing services to victims through a 24-hour hotline, safe accommodations, therapeutic counseling, legal counseling, and court accompaniment. Funds are also used to support community awareness activities and abuse intervention programs. These services are provided through a network of community-based domestic violence programs and are available in every jurisdiction statewide.

At the local level, these programs ensure that victims have access to needed services onsite and also provide victims with linkages to other community-based services as needed. The provision of services at the local level also fosters a coordinated community approach to serving domestic violence victims, including partnerships with law enforcement, courts, hospitals, local departments of social services, and other related support services.

In addition, all DOMV/FVPS-funded domestic violence programs must provide specialized services that reflect an awareness of and sensitivity to the needs of underserved populations and implement their programs in accordance with State and federal regulations or guidelines.

Unserved and underserved victim populations targeted for outreach and services include individuals with mental health and substance abuse issues; individuals with disabilities; those with limited English proficiency; immigrants; people in same-sex relationships; teens; military families; male victims; and individuals and families living in rural areas of the State where access to services may be limited.

In FY 2025, and through the DOMV/FVPS program, the Office awarded \$5,493,581 to subrecipients with comprehensive domestic violence programs (*as illustrated in Table 7 and Table 8*).²² The awarded funds consisted of \$3,089,770 in State general funds and \$2,403,811 in federal FVPS funds.

Through the DOMV/FVPS program, awarded funds were used to provide comprehensive services to meet the specified needs of domestic violence victims and their families. In addition, and based on the quarterly submission of revised performance measures (*as described in the [evaluation of program assessment for victim services awards](#) section*), awarded subrecipients reported the following outcomes in FY 2025:²³

- 13,776 new victims served through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 4,890 victims served through the DOMV/FVPS program
- 13,360 victims received ongoing services through grants, general funding, fundraising, etc.
 - 4,799 victims received ongoing services through the DOMV/FVPS program
- New and returning victims received the following new and/or ongoing services:
 - 6,507 provided with support services
 - 1,997 referred to Vine Protective Order (VPO)
 - 1,252 registered and/or assisted registering for Vine Protective Order (VPO)

- 1,066 utilized emergency shelter
- 339 received information about services and local resources

Conclusion

The Office will continue to support criminal justice and prevention strategies that provide a system of collaboration and information among stakeholders, security enhancements to non-profit organizations that can be targeted for hate crimes, protective gear for sworn officers, capacity expansion to test SAKs, the establishment and expansion of programs to address the specific needs of survivors of homicide victims, and the services needed to meet the needs of sexual assault and domestic violence victims as well as their families. Through these grant programs, funds will continue to assist subrecipients in the following ways:

- Provide the necessary resources for security technology, supplemental funding for security personnel, training, and other related security expenses to support non-profit organizations, including faith-based organizations, that may be targeted for hate crimes.
- Continue to work with local law enforcement agencies to ensure funds are available for protective body armor or stab-resistant vests.
- Provide resources for CODIS laboratories to expand capacity and test SAKs.
- Provide victim assistance, advocacy, support, and other coordinated responses throughout Maryland to ensure survivors of homicide victims are able to exercise their rights entitled by law.
- Improve the lives of victims and provide the needed services to victims of sexual violence and their families.
- Help comprehensive service providers meet the specific needs of domestic violence victims and their families, including those victims who are members of underserved populations in Maryland's communities.
