	Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services	FY27 Maryland Parole Commission: Psychologists for Risk Assessments - Continuation	The "Maryland Parole Commission - Psychologists for Risk Assessments FY 2027" project addresses the Maryland Parole Commission's need to hire contractual psychologists to perform risk assessments for incarcerated individuals eligible for geriatric parole in accordance with recently enacted legislation (Chapter 102 of 2025 (Senate Bill 181), Correctional Services – Geriatric and Medical Parole). Grant funds will be used to continue to fund three part-time contractual psychologists conducting risk assessments for those incarcerated individuals being considered for geriatric parole as well as those that are being considered for release under traditional parole mechanisms.
	Roca, Inc.	Roca Baltimore Workforce Pathways for Reentry and Recidivism Reduction (WPRRR)	Roca's "Baltimore Workforce Pathways for Reentry and Recidivism Reduction (WPRRR)" program helps to increase economic mobility and reduce recidivism for high-risk, justice-involved young men in Baltimore City who have been recently incarcerated. The program combines transitional employment, workforce readiness, and job placement with long-term CBT-based coaching to support stabilization, behavior change, and long-term job retention.
	Safe Exit Initiative Sei Inc.	Waypoint Reentry Program	The Safe Exit Initiative Sei Inc. "Waypoint Reentry Program" helps to interrupt cycles of justice system involvement and support the behavioral health needs of individuals who experience commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking in the city of Baltimore. The program will provide coordinated screening, stabilization and service linkage, operating as a centralized reentry hub out of Safe Exit Initiative's Harbor Baltimore Drop-In Center located in Southwest Baltimore. Safe Exit Initiative is one of the only survivor-led service providers in Baltimore.
	The Council of State Governments	Maryland Reentry 2030: Strengthening Systems for Successful Return	The Council of State Governments' "Maryland Reentry 2030: Strengthening Systems for Successful Return" program will help to provide intensive technical assistance to the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) and partner agencies to strengthen the state's reentry system and support implementation of Maryland's Reentry 2030 goals through reinvestment in reentry programming and services by strengthening coordination across correctional, supervision, and community-based systems and improving access to critical supports. The program will improve access to core reentry services and supports and help support measurable reductions in recidivism and disparities over time.
	YAAY ME, INC.	OneStep Program	The YAAYME "OneStep Program" is a continuing initiative that empowers justice-involved individuals in Prince George's County, Maryland through comprehensive reentry case management, mentorship, and temporary housing support, including access to emergency housing for individuals in immediate crisis. Utilizing a restorative justice approach, the program provides mentoring and stabilization services to support individuals as they transition back into their communities. By offering personalized guidance, resource navigation, and rapid-response housing assistance, OneStep helps participants overcome barriers to successful reintegration, particularly those related to housing insecurity and instability, while contributing to broader community well-being.

Through law enforcement interdiction and crime reduction efforts, reentry services, pretrial supervision, referrals, access to treatment and rehabilitation, transition services, and peer support, we will assess individuals and present recommendations to the courts utilizing standardized tools. The program will provide referral services to mitigate underlying needs, along with transition services to ensure that individuals are given access to resources that mitigate the barriers they encounter.
	Allegany County State's Attorney's Office	State's Attorney's Office Diversion Program FY2027	The Allegany County Board of Commissioners' "State's Attorney's Office Diversion Program FY2027" program helps to enhance public safety and reduce recidivism among low-level, non-violent offenders. The program provides structured alternatives to incarceration by addressing the root causes of justice involvement—particularly substance use and related behavioral health needs—through targeted referrals to treatment, support services, and community-based resources.

	Western Maryland Area Health Education Center dba AHEC West	Reentry Service Expansion in Western Maryland	The AHEC West "Reentry Service Expansion in Western Maryland" program aims to reduce gaps in reentry and behavioral health services by providing coordinated support, fostering collaboration among partners, and delivering direct services to individuals transitioning from incarceration in Allegany and Garrett counties. The program helps to provide peer recovery support, care coordination, and linkage to housing, treatment, and employment resources. It expands access through on-site support during court proceedings, enabling immediate referral by judges and State's Attorneys, and through targeted engagement with Allegany County's Mental Health Court.

	Anne Arundel County Community Action Agency, Inc.	Pathway to Prosperity Reentry Program	The Anne Arundel County Community Action Agency, Inc. "Pathway to Prosperity Reentry" program targets high risk populations to reduce recidivism in Anne Arundel County, reduce crimes and infractions, and increase the employment rate of returning citizens. The program staff consists of a Case Manager, Reentry Coach, and a Clinician who will identify individuals at high risk for recidivism. The staff will provide comprehensive behavioral health services for residents within 180 days of release.
	Anne Arundel County Department of Detention Facilities	Anne Arundel County Department of Detention Facilities: Pretrial Services Grant	The "Anne Arundel County Department of Detention Facilities Pretrial Services Grant" program, as required by MD Code, Criminal Procedure § 5-103, helps to implement and validate pretrial service instruments within the Jennifer Road Detention Center in Anne Arundel County. The program will validate a tool that will be used to collect required data while making appropriate recommendations for the release of defendants through pretrial supervision while awaiting trial.

MDRRC Anne Arundel: Reentry Services and Outcome Measurement	The "MDRRC Anne Arundel: Reentry Services and Outcome Measurement" program helps to reduce recidivism and close gaps in coordinated reentry support in Anne Arundel County, Maryland. The program provides individualized case management, peer support, workforce and life skills development, and wraparound stabilization services to individuals returning from incarceration, while building formal outcome measurement capacity through a partnership with the University of Maryland.
	Unburdened Heart Inc.	Reentry Pathways	The Unburdened Heart "Reentry Pathways" program helps to reduce recidivism and improve reentry outcomes in Prince George's, Anne Arundel, Baltimore City/County, and surrounding areas in Maryland. The program provides trauma-informed care, workforce development, housing navigation, and behavioral health services tailored to justice-involved men and women from Maryland DPSCS facilities. For this grant cycle, the program will be enhanced by offering a Reentry Specialist Certification track for incarcerated individuals preparing for or recently released, with a focus on emerging adults (18–26) and women. Funds will also support the implementation of a reentry hub to deliver these wraparound services.

This program involves collaboration between community-based services, law enforcement, and workforce development, with a strong focus on housing, case management, and ongoing support.

The program also helps to strengthen career pathways and long-term mobility.
	Baltimore Police Department	Baltimore Police Department's Support for Victims and Victims' Rights	The Baltimore Police Department's "Support for Victims and Victims' Rights" program strengthens victims' rights compliance and enhances infrastructure for victim engagement, documentation, and coordination. The program provides trauma-informed advocacy for high-risk victims, expanding to include fourth-degree sexual assault cases. Using standardized protocols and VSTracking, it improves timely notifications, access to rights, service connections, and documentation in Baltimore. Funding supports resource guides, staff training, case management software, Human Trafficking surveillance equipment, victim stabilization funds, and supplies—ensuring accountability, service quality, and adherence to state victims' rights statutes and federal requirements.

Recidivism Reduction through Workforce Readiness Training and Intensive Case Management and Mobility Coaching	The Center for Urban Families' "Recidivism Reduction through Workforce Readiness Training and Intensive Case Management" program connects justice-involved citizens to barrier removal services and supports them in entering the world of work in Baltimore City. The program is open to Baltimore residents ages 18- 62 and includes intake and assessment and barrier removal support before enrollment in our 3-week work readiness training. Participants receive career coaching, job placement assistance and job retention support. Mobility Coaches provide intensive case management and coaching, in coordination with the Reentry Specialist to help ensure success and reduce recidivism.
	Division of Parole and Probation	Continuation of Wrap-Around Peer Recovery Services for Previously Incarcerated Individuals - DPP FY 27	The Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services "Continuation of Wrap-Around Peer Recovery Services for Previously Incarcerated Individuals" program addresses the need for structured support among Returning Citizens by placing Certified Peer Recovery Specialists (CPRS) directly in the Maryland Parole and Probation offices to provide services, including substance use disorder care, referral to mental health services, transitional housing, clothing, food, and shelter. The program is centered around the Peer Recovery model, where employees utilize their experiences to provide connection/mentorship/guidance.
	EMBRACE Initiative	EMBRACE Resource and Reentry Center	The "EMBRACE Resource and Reentry Center (ERRC)" program helps to reduce recidivism and increase successful community reintegration for justice-involved individuals in Baltimore City, Maryland. The program provides comprehensive, one-stop reentry services — including case management, benefits enrollment, legal and identification document assistance, behavioral health linkage through Health and Recovery Practice (HARP), Department of Addiction Research and Treatment, and victim services through the Rebuild, Overcome, and Rise (ROAR) Program — for adults returning from state and local correctional facilities, serving 3000 or more individuals annually.
	From Prison Cells to PhD, Inc.	Prison to Professionals (P2P) Scholars Program	The From Prison Cells to PhD, Inc. "Prison to Professionals (P2P) Scholars" program helps to provide structured, wraparound support for justice-involved women returning to the community. The program will serve justice-impacted women—many of whom have histories of incarceration and substance use—by integrating transitional housing, workforce development, education, recovery support, and family stabilization services into a single, coordinated reentry model. The program will also promote long-term stability, reduce recidivism, and strengthen families and communities across Baltimore City.
	HealthCare Access Maryland, Inc.	Returning Citizens Community Connections	HealthCare Access Maryland's "Returning Citizens Community Connections" program increases access to health and social services for successful community re-entry. The program will provide 250 clients experiencing chronic and/or behavioral health conditions with 90-days of care coordination while reintegrating to Baltimore City. Clients will be assisted to establish community-based health care, including participation in behavioral health treatment and recovery programs, and connect with support services addressing social determinants of health needs.
	Identity Access Project Inc.	Reentry Access Initiative: Removing Identification Barriers for Successful Reintegration	The Identity Access Project "Reentry Access Initiative" program helps individuals returning from incarceration obtain vital identification documents in Baltimore City. The program provides coordinated assistance to secure birth certificates, from all 50 states, and Maryland state IDs through a high-demand Walk-In Wednesday model and a strong reentry-focused referral network. Program funds will support expanded service delivery, document costs, and the launch of the Maryland Document Access Convener Network to improve coordination, reduce duplication, accelerate access to housing and employment, and support successful reentry outcomes that reduce recidivism.
	Institute of Human Virology	CORE (Center of Re-entry and Enrichment)	In July 2025, Institute of Human Virology's THRIVE Program established "CORE (Center of Re-entry and Enrichment)" as a re-entry hub providing medical and wraparound services to individuals returning home to Baltimore City. The program focuses on reducing recidivism by providing access to medical care, mental health, substance use assessments/screenings, employment counseling, and housing services.

	Living Classrooms Foundation	Project SERVE Employment Training and Re-entry Program	Living Classrooms Foundation's "Project SERVE (PS) Employment Training and Re-entry Program" helps to increase employment levels and reduce recidivism for adults—with an emphasis on emerging adults—returning from incarceration to Baltimore City. Project SERVE provides participants with paid on-the-job training in multiple sectors, industry-recognized credentials, career skills training, job placement, behavioral health services, and comprehensive support to mitigate barriers to success. The main function of Project SERVE is to decrease recidivism in Baltimore City by providing returning citizens with comprehensive support services.

Marian House Comprehensive Reentry Program for Women & Families	The Marian House, Inc.'s "Comprehensive Reentry Program for Women & Families" program helps to assist in providing incarcerated/justice-impacted single women and mothers a safe, secure, and supportive path forward to reenter the community. The program will enhance our ability to locate more eligible participants in the State of Maryland to whom we can provide affordable housing, treatment for substance use disorders, behavioral health needs, and workforce development in Baltimore City. Our Outreach & Intake Coordinator advances our initiative to reduce recidivism rates and achieve successful reentry outcomes.
	Maryland Department of Labor	Virtual Instruction and Engagement Program Expansion	The Maryland Department of Labor's Office Correctional Education (OCE)'s "Virtual Instruction and Engagement Program" reduces barriers to educational access and supports successful community reintegration for Maryland's incarcerated individuals (IIs). The program updates existing academic, occupational, and behavioral health curricula and integrates it into a comprehensive virtual learning platform and management system behind the fence. This platform facilitates both synchronous and asynchronous virtual instruction that allows IIs to continue learning when correctional institutions do not have the staff to run in-person programming.
	Maryland Office of the Public Defender	Public Defender Co-Occurring Diversion Project	The Maryland Office of the Public Defender's "Public Defender Co-Occurring Diversion" project helps to expand access to alternatives to incarceration; behavioral health treatment; and reentry services in Central Maryland counties. The program serves individuals charged with a crime who have co-occurring mental health conditions, cognitive impairments, substance abuse disorders, and/or medical concerns. Social workers provide an assessment and referral to evidence-based treatment options, and a peer recovery specialist provides reentry planning, service referrals, and ongoing support.
	Mayor's Office of Employment Development (MOED)	Bridging the Gap: Re-entry and Recovery Workforce Development in Baltimore City	The City of Baltimore Mayor's Office of Employment Development's (MOED) "Bridging the Gap: Re-entry and Recovery Workforce Development in Baltimore City" will expand and strengthen workforce development services for returning citizens, justice-involved residents, and those in recovery from substance use disorder. Grant funding will continue to support a Job Developer to serve justice-involved clients; add a Job Developer dedicated to serving residents in recovery; and maintain driver's education and supported-employment participation incentives within MOED's menu of wraparound services for the reentry/recovery population.
	Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement (MONSE)	MONSE Housing Support for Returning Citizens	The "MONSE Housing Support for Returning Citizens" program helps to provide transitional housing and intensive wraparound services to people returning to Baltimore City following incarceration. The program is designed to reduce recidivism and promote long-term self-sufficiency by addressing the most critical barriers to successful reentry: safe and stable housing, connections to benefits and behavioral health services. Participants engage in structured check-ins and site visits to monitor stability, address barriers, and reinforce accountability. The program emphasizes goal-setting, income stabilization, and preparation for independent living by requiring employment within a defined timeframe and by supporting participants in budgeting and financial planning.
	NAMI Metropolitan Baltimore, Inc.	Mental Health Court Peer Supports	NAMI Metropolitan Baltimore's "Mental Health Court Peer Supports" collaborates with the Baltimore City District Mental Health Court by providing volunteer stipends, setting up a peer support network for families, and facilitating the participation of staff and volunteers in the court's docket days. This initiative will also involve ensuring continued engagement and expanding support services for individuals with mental health conditions involved in the justice system. The program is designed to enhance diversion opportunities, reduce recidivism, and provide much-needed resources for families navigating the mental health court system.

	Natural Born Champions Inc.	Justice to Career Workforce Initiative	The Natural Born Champions Inc. "Justice to Career Workforce Initiative" helps to address a critical gap in post-release support by providing intentional, high-touch services during the period when individuals are most vulnerable to recidivism. The program provides comprehensive support including case management, mentorship, workforce training, industry-recognized credentials, and direct job placement. Wraparound services such as housing support, transportation, healthcare referrals, and education pathways. The program also helps to reduce barriers and ensure continuity of care.

Building Stability, Reducing Recidivism: A Community-Led Reentry Initiative	The Out For Justice, Inc.'s "Building Stability, Reducing Recidivism: A Community-Led Reentry Initiative" program helps expand access to workforce development, behavioral health, and coordinated reentry services for justice-involved individuals in Baltimore City. The program provides job readiness training, trauma-informed clinical services, legal support, and leadership development to returning citizens in high-need communities. Participants receive individualized support to improve stability, employment, and successful reintegration.

Philemon Ministry Men's Residential Reentry Program	The "Philemon Ministry Men's Residential Reentry Program" provides comprehensive men's reentry support including housing and employment to reduce recidivism in Baltimore City. The program focuses on key pillars of spiritual health, life skills, accountability, acts of service, supportive community, workforce development and placement. Philemon's model goes beyond traditional reentry services by emphasizing personal development and values-based programming. Through daily structure, accountability, and community, participants develop the internal discipline, identity, and resilience necessary to sustain long-term success.
	PIVOT Inc.	PIVOT Women's Reentry Program	The "PIVOT Women's Reentry & Workforce Development Program" closes the revolving door of incarceration for women in Baltimore City and surrounding counties. The program provides pre-release reentry prep followed by a community based 12-week training and wraparound supports. The training consists of 150 hours of group learning covering topics from life skills to job readiness to physical and mental wellness, and 50+ hours of individual work including therapy, case management, personal success coaching and career counseling. The program serves a total of 60 women pre-release and 60 women post-release annually.
	PREPARE Inc	Parole and Reentry Preparation: Education and Services	PREPARE's "Parole and Reentry Preparation: Education and Services" program guides and supports people incarcerated in Maryland as they work toward becoming good candidates for parole and facing reentry with a robust plan for success. The educational element applies in all prisons and many jails in Maryland. Remote consultation via our PO Box is available to everyone incarcerated in Maryland. In-person services are provided in MCI-W, ECI, JCI and Patuxent. Direct services are provided to all women and to a subset of the male prison population in building parole packets and developing individualized reentry plans with relevant provider connections in place.
	Restorative Response Baltimore, Inc.	RRB Restorative Reentry Hub: Penn North/Reservoir Hill	The Restorative Response Baltimore (RRB) "Restorative Reentry Neighborhood Hub" program helps reduce gaps in reentry services, strengthens collaboration, and provides coordinated wraparound support to justice-involved individuals returning home in Baltimore City. The program expands Welcome Home Circles and establishes a Neighborhood Hub in Penn North/Reservoir Hill. Participants engage in Accountability Circles and Restorative Reentry/Welcome Home Circles as entry points to healing and reentry planning, with connections to reentry navigation, behavioral health, and workforce services.
	St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center, Inc.	180 Homeshare 2027	St. Ambrose Housing Aid Center's "180 Homeshare" program seeks to reduce recidivism and pathways to prison in Baltimore City and County. Imagine leaving prison after 5+ years or having an arrest record as a young adult. Where will you live? How will you find work? Many justice-involved people reoffend due to lack of housing and employment opportunities. 180 Homeshare will connect Returning Citizens and justice involved young adults to housing, workforce development, healthcare, and more, enabling the participants to secure permanent housing and avoid returning to prison.
	The Nolita Project Inc	The Gateway Project: Strengthening Families through Re-entry Support	The Nolita Project Inc. "Gateway Project: Strengthening Families Through Reentry Support" helps families in Baltimore, Maryland who are impacted by incarceration—whether currently incarcerated or community-based. The Nolita Project's Gateway Project supports parents as they reintegrate into the community and reconnect with their children. Program funds support personnel, case management support, operating expenses, and contractual services. The project offers case management for parents, mentorship for children, and family engagement education and activities designed to strengthen family stability and long-term success.

	Tuerk House Inc.	D2R2.4 (Diversion Deflection Recidivism Reduction renewal)	Tuerk House's "D2R2.4" reduces service gaps and re-incarceration risk by delivering behavioral health outreach, engagement, treatment linkage, and care coordination for justice-impacted women, veterans, and transition-age youth in Baltimore City. The program advances NOFA priorities through diversion/deflection, rapid access to mental health and SUD treatment, crisis stabilization, and coordinated pathways into detox, inpatient, and continuing care. It addresses barriers including homelessness, trauma, co-occurring conditions, transportation, cost, and other social determinants of health, strengthening recovery, reintegration, and recidivism reduction.
	University of Maryland, Baltimore	Caroline County and University of Maryland Baltimore "Caroline Substance Use Recovery Endeavor (C-SURE)"	The County Commissioners of Caroline County "Caroline Substance Use Recovery Endeavor (C-SURE)" project will help to provide medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD) treatment for people incarcerated at Caroline County Detention Center (thus maintaining compliance with Maryland code § 9-603 [heretofore "HB-116"]) and help sustain a contingency management (CM) intervention to retain people participating in problem-solving court (PSC) in Caroline County, Maryland. The program will also leverage two powerful, evidence-based interventions to benefit incarcerated or PSC participants with substance use disorder.
	University of Maryland, Baltimore	Queen Anne's County Detention Center and University of Maryland Baltimore Rural Initiative for Detention Guidance and Engagement (QACDC-UM BRIDGE)	The Queen Anne's County Detention Center and University of Maryland Baltimore Rural Initiative for Detention Guidance and Engagement (QACDC-UM BRIDGE) helps to supplement gaps in a MOOR-supported clinical service program to screen, refer and treat opioid use disorder-diagnosed individuals incarcerated at the Queen Anne's County Detention Center. The current grant does not fund nursing clinical services or several mission-critical administrative costs. This is a comprehensive program, and without these additional elements, our implementation of Maryland code § 9-603 (HB-116) is hampered.
	University of Maryland, Baltimore - Dept. of Psychiatry	UMD HARP/Greater Mondawmin Behavioral Health Initiative	A community-based HARP team — consisting of a Social Worker and a Peer Recovery Specialist — will provide integrated behavioral health treatment, facilitated MOUD initiation and support with addiction-trained physicians, harm reduction services, and social service navigation for individuals at risk of justice involvement along the Reisterstown Corridor. These services align with HARP's mission to expand access to evidence-based OUD treatment for underserved populations in Baltimore City. As a program with documented community outcomes in West Baltimore — including a 582-person active patient panel — HARP is uniquely qualified to lead this expansion.
	York Corridor Business Improvement District Management Authority, Inc.	York Road Corridor Comprehensive Outreach Program	The York Corridor Business Improvement District Management Authority, Inc. "York Road Corridor Comprehensive Outreach" program helps to reduce justice-system involvement and service gaps for adults experiencing behavioral health, substance use, housing, and reentry-related instability in Baltimore City. The program provides proactive street outreach, crisis de-escalation, case management, harm reduction, reentry navigation, and rapid connection to treatment, housing, workforce, and stabilization services for justice-involved adults and adults at imminent risk of arrest or reincarceration.

The program will provide conflict resolution skill-building training to the women detainees admitted to the START (Striving to Achieve Recovery Together) program at the Baltimore County Detention Center. The trainings will support their skills and capacity to both decrease inter-detainee conflict and increase productive relationships on release.
	Family Crisis Center of Baltimore County, Inc.	Emergency Shelter and Support Services for Domestic Violence Victims	The Family Crisis Center of Baltimore County's "Emergency Shelter and Support Services for Domestic Violence Victims" program helps to provide direct services to victims in Baltimore County. The program delivers a coordinated continuum of care, including a 24-hour crisis hotline, emergency shelter, victim advocacy, housing stabilization, and trauma-informed counseling. Services support individuals experiencing domestic violence by addressing immediate safety needs while promoting long-term stability. Victims receive crisis intervention, confidential shelter, and ongoing support to overcome barriers related to housing, safety, and trauma.
